Dear Parents and Carers,



News from Post 16

James Sherwood from MADE Training visited Post 16 on Wednesday to deliver bespoke training sessions for Year 12 and Year 13. MADE training are experts in thinking, learning and revision strategies and have successfully been working with our A-level students for many years.

Year 12's session, 'Stepping Up', addressed the shift in gear from GCSE to A-levels and suggested strategies to deal with these new demands. The students focussed on developing creative thinking to enhance concentration and reduce stress; solving problems and making informed decisions; becoming active readers and taking meaningful notes, using the Cornell method; and applying the 'Win-Learn-Change' reflection technique to their learning.

Year 13, who are that bit closer to their final examinations, took part in the 'Exams Made Easy' session, which is specifically centred around successful revision strategies. James outlined a range of methods to enable students to measure their own progress and attainment through benchmarking; he covered techniques from mind mapping to spatial memory ('The Memory Palace') to creating effective cue cards. All of these approaches help students improve their memory skills and become more aware of their own abilities and potential. Hopefully Year 13 are now feeling a bit more confident and positive as they begin to prepare for their mock exams in January!

Next week, we are looking forward to our Post 16 Hustings on Wednesday, when we will select our Y12 and Y13 representatives for the Student Board.

On Thursday, several of our students will be joining the Othello trip to Stratford upon Avon, which is set to be a real highlight of the autumn term!

Congratulations to the Year 7 boys who made it 2/2 this term with a strong and convincing win away at Honiton Community College on Wednesday. The game was hosted in beautiful weather conditions at Honiton, with this lending itself to some outstanding skills on show from both sides, which included silky running, handling and sharp contact skills.

Skipper, Reid B won the toss and opted for his team to kick off, with Clyst Vale taking the ascendancy almost immediately with some strong carries of the ball and dominant tackling of the opposition. These games were sandwiched with a very intense game versus Okehampton College which ended in a 1-1 draw after they scored a well-deserved equalising score at the death.

Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Reporting an Absence

Parents are expected to inform us of their child's absence before 9.00 a.m. on each day of absence providing the reason for absence. If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness. If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy. In addition, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if your child is absent from College due to illness.

Lateness

The school day (first registration session) starts at 8.50 am, all students are expected to be in their classroom at this time.


Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. We ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment if they can.

Please give the school as much notice as possible, at least two weeks' notice is useful.

If the appointment requires the pupil to leave during the day, they must be signed out by an adult listed on the student's record at the main reception.
